

Visit of Norfolk Island student Bowlers to Central Coast.

Last month I received an email from Sally-Ann Johnson, President of RC Norfolk Island, advising that their Rotary Club was helping financially to sponsor 3 young ladies from Norfolk Island to a CHS Sports Association Lawn Bowls tournament at Bateau Bay on 20th to 22nd August. Could we provide assistance of a cheer squad or help in any other way? The bowlers are Ellie Dixon aged 14 (who had recently won gold in a team event in Samoa), Maycee and Tracy both aged 16 and have been bronze medallists in another NSW schools competition.

The Board decided that we could help and President Clive also contacted Bob Davison, a past President of his former RC West Pennant Hills/Cherrybrook, who has family connections in Norfolk Island. Bob was able to persuade his Rotary Club to donate \$600.00 towards costs of the trip, plus making a personal donation.

On Monday, 19th August, Robin and Clive met up with the accompanying parents at Bateau Bay Bowling Club – Susie Dixon (nee Hale), Tara Patal and Betty Wora. The girls were in a 4's competition so a student bowler from Taree joined them and they competed as North Coast A, (the Education Dept. region for Norfolk Island). Susie and Tara had added a few extra days to the trip to see their families at Woy Woy and Bowral.

Robin went on Tuesday morning to Bateau Bay Bowling Club and organised lunch for the girls from nearby shops. Bob Davison and his wife Bev came down on Wednesday to see them bowl, (whilst the rest of us were at Bunnings BBQ), and stayed overnight with Clive and Jenny. On Thursday Clive, Bob, Bev and Robin took all the bowlers and their siblings and mothers to a farewell lunch at Bateau Bay Bowling Club. It was agreed that after deduction of lunch expenses for the bowlers, that \$510 would be donated to the families for their travel, car hire and accommodation costs – thank you to RC West Pennant Hills/Cherrybrook.

Night Report – Meeting held on Tuesday 20 August 2019

Present: Pres Clive, Robin, Gordon , Peter, David & John plus Shirl & Speaker Margaret

Directors reports:

Membership Gordon confirmed Paul Barnett (CEO Mingara) & Phil Walker as speakers at Community Forum Breakfast on Sept 30 . Shane player (Principal TLSC- Tumbi Campus had confirmed intention to attend & Emma McBride's staff were seeing whether it fitted with her diary (*subsequently confirmed attendance*)

John confirmed he was happy to keep membership listing up to date & issue periodically.

Treasurer- Peter noted that term deposit for smart pup was due to roll over on 25th August 7 asked Clive to organise withdrawal.

David (**Club service**) said he'd modified 4 community raffle letters & was keen to send them out asap. After a brief discussion concerns were expressed that community organisations who had not taken part last year would get confused. (*pres note: to address this concern David put the simple introductory selling doc out as the main email & added the more detailed informational docs as attachments*).

It was agreed we would give about 2 weeks for initial response & then a group of members would share the list to email or phone to expand the number of community organisations participating.

David asked whether the Club would allow RYLA to do the extra Bunnings on 5th Wed Oct. (30th Oct)

Robin said he expected printed tickets for the Community raffle back by 1st week sept latest

Presidents Report- Clive reported back briefly on some matters from C.C Pres meeting on Friday 16th & said he'd speak in more detail at Board .

Peter reported that Dick smith had offered Rotary a further \$1m in matching grants to support projects that benefitted individuals. Agreed to discuss at Board

Gordon then Introduced Margaret (a lady of English ancestry) to talk about migrating to Australia in the early 50s.

Margaret spoke very eloquently on a subject in which she had a real interest & which she brought to life with recollections from her childhood.

It will be difficult to do it justice but I'll cover some of the things that really struck home (to me a much later Pommie migrant who flew over in 1982 & stayed with my wife's family for 12 months, with 2 young children before buying a house in the Hills District)

Margaret's parents were living in a war torn London, 6 years after the war had finished but where rationing of many foodstuffs was still in force. Her father had been in the Royal Engineers in Italy in the latter part of the war & found it had to settle in a cold, wet Britain. He had technical skills & applied to emigrate through a program to bring out telephone technicians. He was accepted & the family came out in the SS Otranto in June 1951. It had been used as a troopship & the family were fortunate to have their own cabin. Margaret said that her parents had commented on how good & plentiful the food was & that it felt like the first real family holiday they had had as the ship took some 6 weeks to reach Australia.

By today's standards the accommodation at the migrant hostel at East Hills sounds very basic. It consisted of half a Nissan hut with communal washing facilities & meals. Furthermore, it was relatively expensive & used up a high portion of her father's wage making it necessary for her mother to seek employment in the communal kitchen. Margaret said she had an enjoyable childhood there with her younger siblings. They had plenty of scope for outdoor activities with little direct parental supervision. The camp backed on to

Williams Creek & her parents made it a high priority for them to learn to swim. Margaret recalled having the responsibility each day to get her sister ready for playgroup & to drop her off before catching the bus to school (this at aged 6).

Highlights included her father buying a car before 1955 for \$300 & going to Friday night films at the hostel & later at the Saturday morning pictures at the local cinema.

Less pleasant experiences came with diseases that hospitalised both her parents at various times & which brought some serious financial pain in a time where there was no Medicare & when private insurance was not common amongst many working people. Margaret reflected that although many camp residents were of British extraction that there were also, often single, displaced people from Europe & she remembered that it was one of them who helped to look after the 2 little girls when both parents were sick. It was also rather shocking to hear that local drunken thugs from Hammondville used to periodically come to the camp & pick fights with residents, including her father on one occasion (this sort of behaviour was directed in later years against many new group of migrants - Italians, Greeks & later Vietnamese & that the police showed little interest in getting involved or following it up.)

After some 5 years at the camp the family built a home in a way that was common then but less so nowadays. They bought a block of land & first built a garage in which they lived until they gradually added further rooms.

Margaret appears to have had an interesting life in Australia with a variety of jobs and responsible roles in various community organisations, some of which assist latter day migrants and she has a good selection of photos of those early days in Australia which help keep some of her memories very fresh indeed.

“Ride the Train “ to End Polio on Sat 24th October

For those of you that couldn't be at the Presidents meeting last Saturday, Mark Anderson (Rotary Foundation) spoke about the Rotary train Ride to End Polio.

This year the Train ride will also include Newcastle & Central Coast Railway stations & will start at Scone as well as at Dungog, travelling down to Gosford & then down to Berowra where Newcastle & Central Coast Rotarians could meet up with Sydney/Blue Mountains Rotarians, travel down to Hornsby with them & then return to Central Coast or continue on train to Sydney.

The idea is that Rotarians who volunteer to “Ride the Train” would get some sponsorship plus their Rotary Club would donate say \$1950 (\$10 per station) & Club Rotarians might donate/sponsor “Ride the Train” Club members @ say \$1 per station. They are also encouraging any Participants to order & wear the Red “End Polio T-shirts” which can be ordered from RDU

At the recent District Foundation meeting we asked if Central Coast Clubs be included in the Ride because they weren't last year so now that we have been included, I really hope that Central Coast Clubs will get behind this great event and support it either by donating towards it or “Riding the Train” or both & that we can get a lot of our Clubs to help end Polio by donating the \$1950 suggested.

District asked that Foundation Directors promote it to members.
