Humphries was an unknown aspiring
actor and would-be comedian when I first met
him in the early 1950s. It is true that he put me
on stage for the first time in December 1955,
but it was in order to belittle me and get cheap
laughs at my expense and ridicule the great
Australian way of life.

How the tables were turned! I became the star and he merely a footnote to my spectacular career. His tragedy was his desire to be an artist and we know what happens to failed artists – Hitler, for example – they either become interior decorators or mass murderers. Barry was spared this fate. He became rich due to my efforts and signed me up to a contract that bound me for life.

He had a lovely family and my heart goes out to them as well as to his unfortunate wives and numerous stage-struck research assistants.

If these words seem uncharitable in the context of an obituary, I am fortunate that *The Daily Telegraph*, unsurprisingly, was eager to publish them.

SNIPPETS FROM THE BOARD MEETING HELD 18TH APRIL

Treasurer Julie highlighted **the costs associated with our normal running of the club**. This will need to be taken into account when determining club fees for next year.

Following various donations to **ROMAC** recently from our club, Louise will circulate the latest ROMAC Newsletter that highlights some of their great work that our club is supporting financially.

This Year's **Bunny Hunt** was a very successful event, making approximately \$700 profit and creating fun for many families in the Long Jetty area. Having been supported by the Fire service, Kathleen has asked if we can make a donation in acknowledgement. The exact amount is to be determined.

We have permission to continue **Spin and Win** at Bateau Bay for the next 12 months. Spin and Win on the third Saturday is a bit quiet, so we may replace it with a mid-week event. It is felt by some, that the benefits derived from this activity do not match the time and effort given. Further permissions are to be sought.

Bunnings are suggesting a Friday BBQ (in addition to our weekend events). Four groups (of which we are one) have been approached to trial the idea.

The Busking Competition paperwork has now been submitted to Council and is awaiting approval. Erina Rotary Club have confirmed that approximately \$5k in grant money has been secured. Council has proposed allowing a remote on-line application for a busking licence. Alternative under consideration is Rotary taking responsibility for buskers providing proof of holding performers liability insurance.

The **Hots district grant** has now been finalised. Thanks to Greg for the additional PR generated.

Community Directory Update - Over \$12k has been secured for funding. 5,000 copies are likely to be printed. There is \$1,000 left to cover postage. Support was given by various members of the club to assist with distribution. Joe is to coordinate with members.

It was agreed that a set of **'Hope' Directors Pins** (reflecting this year's RI Focus) and podium banner will be purchased from RDU. A banner with our mission statement will also be produced.

As we approach the end of the financial year, David reminded all officers to submit their report to him by the end of May.

Greg has kindly offered to **store Rotary items** that are currently at David's house.

Joe would like to see **further Facebook promotion** around the '\$1m in funds raised' headline.

Joey's Amazon Trip

Throughout my 9 days of travel to the Amazon and Manaus, I saw things I never knew existed, and I had the time of my life. I made amazing new life long friends and kept contact with them all.



During this trip I got the opportunity to swim and touch pink dolphins. It was absolutely amazing seeing the dolphin up close and getting to touch them. The guides would put a diving mask on us and they would push us down under the water, having the ability to see the entire body of the dolphins.

Their bodies are incredible. They have a soft skin like feel to it and they aren't actually pink, they are more grayish colour. These creatures were beautiful and I am so happy I got to have this experience.

On the second day of the boat trip traveling the Negro River, we went to visit an indigenous Brazilian tribe who has lived in the Amazon rainforest for a long time. They showed us around their camp area, where they cooked and where they prepared meals.

They performed multiple dances for us, and also letting everyone take part in the dancing at the end. The indigenous people had made beautiful handmade jewellery which we were able to buy, and we were also able to get some traditional face and arm painting done. It was a very different experience and I think because it was different it made it so exciting.



On the day before leaving for Manaus, we all got the opportunity to free little baby turtles into the wild in the Negro River. These turtles were grown and taken care of in a little village on the shore of the Negro River. It was so cute to see these baby turtles go free. The people who took care of these turtles explained that releasing

these turtles, only 30% of them survive and 70% of them die. But they said this was part of nature and what we were doing was really helping their population.



I don't think there is any place in the world with more beautiful sunsets than the Amazon rainforest. I had a really "Amazon' " time, and I am super happy to be able to share it all with you.


