3 Treasurer's Report 2022-23

This has been a very successful year financially for the club. Flagship project has been the Bunnings BBQs, which have brought in more than \$23,500 and netted our club over \$12,500. As well as being a comfortable earner and allowing us to spend time working together with other club members, it has given us the opportunity to support Central Coast Kids in Need and, through the Mini Car Club, the Make-a-Wish Foundation.

Most disappointing project had to be the Christmas Trees, which failed to arrive on the first weekend due to weather problems in Victoria, but nevertheless with a few extra trees the second weekend we still made over 65% of budget. However not the big earner we had been hoping for.

Our new project in conjunction with Erina RC was the Busking Competition, which unfortunately made a significant loss of \$842. I put that down to inexperience and shortage of lead time – it was the dud year we really had to have. I have high hopes for our second attempt as other Rotary Clubs make quite a bit of money from this activity – although sponsorship seems to me to be the key.

The Community Raffle should certainly rate a mention, having reached the 1 Million dollar mark in its 39th year. But what was actually exciting for our club was that between member sales and sales in shopping centres, we took in over \$4000 ourselves in ticket sales, allowing us a club profit after costs of \$2500. This was an easy way for us to make money, as the work had already been done. And Spin and Win has also raised over \$4000 net in addition to those sales – a mammoth effort by club members every fortnight.

Another first time project was Christmas wrapping at Tuggerah Westfield. With no outlay, just manpower, we made \$1119. And it was fun seeing what people had bought each other for Christmas. And this year the Easter Bunny Hunt was well supported and netted \$813.

During the year we have donated an MRI machine to the HoTS Team, with the support of a Rotary District grant. We also sponsored CCPC's Mental Health Art Show, donated \$500 towards food for the homeless, \$200 to a little girl with a health condition, and augmented Christmas with toys and Christmas cakes to the value of \$390. We have released a Central Coast Community Directory of services for disadvantaged people, where the launch and printing costs have been covered by sponsorship (including \$5000 from the Central Coast Council) with very little financial input from us.

If you take into account the \$27,000 which passed through our hands on its way to the community for the raffle, the \$1,897 donated to Grandparents Raising Grandchildren from the Christmas Tree sales, and our year end giving of \$15,000 our monetary contribution to our community (and a bit going overseas) was just over \$57,000 – not bad for a small club.

I commend the Christmas Tree team that faced the public when trees were not available to explain the situation. Aside from being the right thing to do it was PR at its best and I'm sure has left a lasting impression on our customers.

In many small ways our PR has evolved over the past year – the conversations held during events, the flyers and materials we are sharing and so forth. We are building good momentum.

8 Community Service Report Year 2022-23

8.1 Annual Community Raffle.

The Central Coast Million Dollar Rotary Club (The Rotary Club of The Entrance)

Over the last 39 years The Rotary Club of The Entrance have been running a Community Raffle where local charities sell raffle tickets to raise money for their own organisations. This year the total raised over the 39-year period has passed the one-million-dollar mark at \$1,002,625, with 36 charity and community groups taking part during the year, raising over \$30,000 for the local community.

The Rotary Club procures the prizes and pays for printing the tickets. They then invite local charities to sell the tickets over a 20-week period with the Raffle draw being held in mid-February. After the draw the Rotary Club donates back the value of all tickets sold to participating organisations. The beauty of this project is that is enables small local groups to sell tickets, knowing that every ticket they sell will result in the money they raise coming back to them. And although the administration can be onerous, the club is able to direct significant funds into the community.

The club's first Combined Community Raffle was conducted in 1985-86, being the brainchild of a Rotarian, Merv Harvey who wanted to do something to help local charities. Merv ran the raffle for five years turning it over to Con Bartsos in 1988 who ran it for the next 26 years. In the inaugural year, the first prize was a trip to Fiji; it is now \$4,000 thanks to Mingara. Local community groups participated and received from the club an amount equal to the value of tickets sold. The principle of 100% return to participating organisations was part of the original formula. In its second year, eighteen community organisations sold tickets, with 13500 tickets printed. Money raised was \$9,408.

This is the longest running project for a Rotary Club on the Central Coast winning the 1991 Sydney Morning Herald Community Service Award for the Wyong Shire, having by that time raised \$100,000. In 2002, the club's 30th year, the "30-30-30" goal for the club's Community Raffle was achieved: a \$3,000 prize and \$30,000 raised and breaking through the \$300,000 mark in total funds raised by community organisations since the inception of the project.

Over the period 214 local charities have participated ranging from Scout groups, Surf lifesaving, Ronald McDonald house, Historical societies, softball and football clubs, bush fire brigades to Neighbourhood Centres. Some organisations have been participating for up to 20 years and have made the raffle their main means of fundraising. Current Raffle organiser David Waterhouse commented "For instance, over the last 39 years, clubs such as 1st Kanwal Scout Group raised almost \$20,000, Wyong Family History Group \$37,300, the Berkeley Vale Rural Fire Service raised \$31,00 and the Special Olympics Central Coast Region raised about \$31,000, just to name a few."

Special thanks must go to James Sleeman and his staff from Sleeman Optometry at Chittaway Bay for the distribution and collection of tickets from their shop over many years. This is now done by club members in the foyer at Mingara.

In 2019 the captain of the local Rural Fire Service decided to buy all remaining tickets from books sold by the members of the brigade. On the night of the draw, we were amazed when his name was on the first and second tickets drawn from the barrel!

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During COVID, our club depended on the raffle as our major fundraiser raising approximately \$6,000 in 2020-21

Last year the club celebrated its 50th Anniversary. During the proceedings, long time Raffle Organiser Con Bartsos, was acknowledged with a Paul Harris Fellowship for the work he had done in keeping the raffle running over 26 years. This project is our most important annual activity.

The club is very grateful to our wonderful sponsors, who year after year provide at no cost to us the prizes for the Raffle. Mingara Recreational Club has been providing the cash prize, this year increased to \$4000. This year's other sponsors were Helloworld Travel Bateau Bay, Gem Design Jewellers, The Entrance, Ming Dragon Restaurant, Mingara and Bunnings Warehouse Tuggerah. All tickets have had a popular two for one McDonalds voucher on them thanks to Saronbell Pty Ltd.

8.2 Spin & Win

Projecting to the end of the Rotary year there will have been 16 Spin and Win Saturdays for the 2022/2023 year. Remembering that five Spin and Win days were given over to selling Community Raffle tickets. It is also projected that we will have had about 75 spins in this time.

I am happy to see the number of spins is increasing since we changed ticket price from \$2.00 to \$3.00. Which then increased the price value from \$30.00 to \$40.00.

Over the later period of this time, we have trialled several different prizes. From meat vouchers to Easter Eggs and then Coles Vouchers. It is not the prize that our customers respond to, and it made very little difference to sales. Instead, I think the shock of the cost-of-living increases took time to be accepted. On my last experience of Spin and Win I did note that people were selling themselves up more when offering \$5.00 they then rounded it off to \$6.00 to purchase two chances. Regardless I note a much happier crowd with that happy benevolence towards our effort to raise money for the community. As opposed the sense that the only thing was for them to win a prize.

There is no doubt that Spin and Win remains the face of Rotary in the community, with many our customers saying they participate to support Rotary. It is a place where we raise our profile and explain what we do with the money we raise. I also believe that it is great place to invite new members to join us, even if they are not interested, they receive the offer in a good light and with a sense of good will.

I think if we have members that are happy to give up their Saturdays for Spin and Win, it will continue as a Rotary project. I would like to thank all the members that have supported Spin & Win over the past year.

In addition CCKIN's prorata share was worth over \$2000 and the Mini Club raised over \$1000 for The "Make a Wish" foundation

Our aim is to assist people in finding the support they require by informing them of what is available. It is often difficult to find info on where or how to seek help & when they need it most. Hence, we are trying to make to it easy to seek suitable help by not having to navigate through complex websites.

Our aim is to provide and maintain this directory. Please note that this directory covers the <u>whole of</u> the Central Coast.

- Printed in <u>plastic with sticky side</u> and targeting o install at the back of females' toilet doors with one copy in the male's toilet. We had 2000 copies of this printed at a cost of \$5,000 and the Central Coast Freemasons donated all the money for this.

The Directory:

- This is in A6 and have about 106pages. We printed 5000 copies of this and we had \$11,000 donated to us from CC Council (\$5,000), Emma McBride (\$2,200), Mingara Club (\$1,000), The Entrance Food Hub (\$1,000), Rotary Wyong (\$1,000), Rotary Woy Woy(\$500), FMS (\$500), Bateau Bay and Berkeley Vale Neighbourhood Centres (\$250), Rotary Gosford (\$250), Rotary The Entrance (\$250), San Remo Neighbourhood Centre (\$200).
- Both the flyers and the printed books are being distributed for free.

8.6 Food distribution

This has been another great year for food donations.

Valley Fruit & Grocer Wamberal – the owner, Adrian Wheatley, donated about 10 to 15boxes of fruit and veggies every Tuesday morning, all year round. This is a minimum of 2,000kgs of food plus other surplus grocery items that they

donate. Thanks also to Karen and her staff that

work here. Most of the food is donated to Bateau Bay Neighbourhood centre.

<u>Bakery Delight – Bateau Bay Shopping Centre</u> – This bakery donates a minimum of 8 loaves of bread and 30 bread rolls every Wednesday night, all year round. That's a minimum of

400 loaves (meaning 3200 sandwiches) and 1500 bread rolls over the last year. I butter these, add different meats, cheese, lettuce and / or vegemite or pickles, turn into individually wrapped sandwiches. This food is distributed between The Entrance, Bateau Bay and Berkeley Bay Neighbourhood Centres.

<u>MasterFoods</u> – We have been lucky to get 2 loads of food from Masterfoods in Dec 2022 and June 2023. These have been distributed between The Entrance, Bateau Bay and Berkeley Bay Neighbourhood Centres and the Entrance Food Hub.





<u>Anytime Fitness The Diggers</u> – This gym organized 2 food

collections and Christmas presents. The food was given to the Entrance Food Hub. Christmas presents distributed to our local community.



<u>Norro's Bakehouse</u> – We collected pies and sausages from this bakery over a period of six



months on Friday and Saturday afternoons. We used to collect 50 pies and 40 sausage each time. This approximated to 1300 pies and 1040 sausages. The food was given to the Entrance Food Hub.

CENTRAL COAST HEAT OF AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL BUSKING COMPETITION 2022

The Central Coast heat of the Australian Nation Busking Championships 2022 was held this weekend at The Entrance. The beautiful weather on Sunday brought a host of families and holiday makers to experience the talents of the busking competitors and to make their vote in the People's Choice section of the competition by giving their Favorite busker a token, or two or more!

The Australian National Busking Championships™ (ANBC) is an Australia-wide network of busking festivals, however, this national event has been postponed in recent years due to the COVI-19 restrictions on public events. This annual event celebrates the rich diversity of Australian Music & Street Performance Culture. It was first held in Cooma in 2012 and is now held in 9 locations around the country, culminating in the national finals in Cooma each year where the winner of the grand final is given the title of Australian National Busking Champion along with substantial prize monies.

The Rotary Clubs of Erina and The Entrance worked together to host the Central Coast heat, held at Memorial Park and saw a huge range of performers showcase their talents and their street performing skills as well as attracting over 400 people Prizes totalling \$4000 were sponsored by local businesses, Rotary Clubs and individuals to support the recognition of individuals who devote their time, energy and enthusiasm as performers in the Central Coast region. Categories included Open section (18+ years), Secondary School aged (14 – 17 years) and Primary School aged (13 years and under). Additional prizes were awarded for the People Choice, Judges Encouragement Award, General encouragement awards and Best Band on the day. The winner of each section will go to the finals being held in Cooma on 26 November to compete for the title of Australian National Busking Champion.

"The theme of this year National Festival is to encourage, mentor, promote and develop career pathways for emerging musicians and performing artists of all ages and all music genres, and it's apparent that all the participating buskers have made a great impact on their audiences today!" said a Erina Rotary Club member. "our two Rotary Clubs with the support of Central Coast Council recognised that by hosting a Regional Heat here on the Central Coast we could enrich our communities culturally and economically as part of a national network, the people of the Central Coast are very generous with their support of the buskers on the day and the closing concert, in which all the finalists performed, was a treat for everyone – including the performers who enthusiastically encouraged each other, with cheers and genuine fellowship.
